Episode #1 – What is God?

What is God? People have been asking that question for centuries. It's right up there with "what is the meaning of life". Maybe it should be, Who is God? Do you know who or what is God? Or even, does God exist? Join Byron and Chantal as they explore the Church's teaching on the nature of God.

Grade 9, unit 2 (Called to Wholeness), Grade 10, unit 1 (Called to Jesus)

We Believe: Our profession of faith begins with God, for God is the First and the Last, the beginning and the end of everything. The Creed begins with God the Father, for the Father is the first divine person of the Most Holy Trinity; our Creed begins with the creation of heaven and earth, for creation is the beginning and the foundation of all God's works. (CCC 198)

Christians are baptized in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit: not in their names, for there is only one God, the almighty Father, his only Son and the Holy Spirit: the Most Holy Trinity. (CCC 233)

The mystery of the Most Holy Trinity is the central mystery of Christian faith and life. It is the mystery of God in himself. It is therefore the source of all the other mysteries of faith, the light that enlightens them. It is the most fundamental and essential teaching in the "hierarchy of the truths of faith". The whole history of salvation is identical with the history of the way and the means by which the one true God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, reveals himself to men "and reconciles and unites with himself those who turn away from sin". (CCC 234)

Word of God:

God reveals his name to Moses: (Exodus 3:13-15)

Questions for Discussion:

- 1. So many people today don't believe in the existence of God. Does he exist or not?
- 2. What are some arguments for God's existence? (Example: If you were stranded on an island and found a beautiful house standing there, would you think it was there by chance or did someone have to build it? The same applies to God and his design of the universe.)
- 3. St. Paul tells us that from the visible things of this world we come to know the invisible things of God. What does this mean?
- 4. God is One. But God is also a Trinity of three distinct persons; Father, Son and Holy Spirit. All three persons are One God, possessing the same divine substance (Wow, confusing). Can this mystery ever be explained or must we rely on faith alone?
- 5. What do we know about God? (eg. ,He is a Trinity)

Episode #2 - Why Do Bad Things Happen?

If God is a God of love, why do bad things happen? Does anyone know why bad things happen? It seems to be a fact of life. But, so many people reject the existence of God precisely because of that question. Why believe in a God who is completely unfair and lets all these bad things happen? Grade 9, unit 5 (Called to Action), Grade 10, unit 4 (Called to be Holy)

We Believe: If God is the Father almighty, the Creator of the ordered and good world who cares for all his creatures, why does evil exist? To this question, as pressing as it is unavoidable and as painful as it is mysterious, no quick answer will suffice. Only Christian faith as a whole constitutes the answer to this question. (CCC 309)

Angels and men, as intelligent and free creatures, have to journey toward their ultimate destinies by their free choice and preferential love. They can therefore go astray. Indeed, they have sinned. Thus has moral evil, incommensurably more harmful than physical evil, entered the world. God is in no way, directly or indirectly, the cause of moral evil. He permits it, however, because he respects the freedom of his creatures and, mysteriously, knows how to derive good from it. (CCC 311)

Word of God:

God is aware of our sufferings: (Exodus 3:7)

Woman suffering from hemorrhage: (Matthew 9:20)

The glory in heaven greater than our sufferings: (Romans 8:18)

Questions for Discussion:

- 1. If God is a God of love, why do bad things happen?
- 2. What is evil?
- 3. Does God create evil, or does He merely allow it to happen?
- 4. Does God have a plan for evil in the world? (John 9:1-3)
- 5. Why is there suffering in the world?

- 1. Is suffering a result of our own sin? (Moral Evil: CCC 311-312)
- 2. What about suffering not caused by our own sin, such as natural disasters? (Physical Evil: CCC 310)
- 3. What are some examples of how God brings good from evil?
- 4. Salvation is made possible by the sufferings of Jesus. Does our suffering take on a different meaning because of that great event on Calvary?

We Believe: Deliberate hatred is contrary to charity. Hatred of the neighbor is a sin when one deliberately wishes him evil. Hatred of the neighbor is a grave sin when one deliberately desires him grave harm. "But I say to you, love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, so that you may be sons of your Father who is in heaven." (CCC 2302-2306)

- 3. If God is love and we are made in God's image, then can violence which causes harm to someone ever be justified?

Episode #4 – Why Does True Love Ha<u>ve To Wait?</u>

We Believe: Chastity is not primarily a 'NO' to illicit sex. Chastity is first and foremost a great 'YES' to the true meaning of sex, to the goodness of being created as male and female in the image of God. Chastity isn't repressive. It's totally liberating. It frees us from the tendency to use others for selfish gratification and enables us to love others as Christ loves us. The virtue of Chastity is therefore essential if we are to discover and fulfill the very meaning of our being and existence. (From "Good News about Sex and Marriage" by Christopher West pgs. 66-68)

Man and Woman becoming one flesh: (Genesis: 2:24) Jesus speaks about the one flesh union: (Matthew 19:5)

Questions for Discussion:

- 1. What does chastity mean?
- 2. Why shouldn't two consenting adults who love each other be able to have sex? What difference does a marriage certificate really make, anyway?
- 3. Why does the Church teach that sex is reserved for marriage?
- 4. Is the Church saying no to sex? Or is it rather a big 'YES' to the goodness of sexuality, in the right context?
- 5. If sex is a gift from God, and if we are meant to image God in this beautiful act, then should we not respect this great gift?
- 6. Are the Church's teachings on sexuality a bunch of irrational rules, or are they a formula for happiness?

Further Questions for Discussion:

- 1. Is sex just about love? What about commitment and responsibility?
- 2. Has the sexual revolution made our society better? Think of the many STD's, rate of divorce, broken families, broken relationships, child prostitution and pornography objectifying women?

We Believe: The (Catholic) Church is both the means and the goal of God's plan: prefigured in creation, prepared for in the Old Covenant, founded by the words and actions of Jesus Christ, fulfilled by his redeeming cross and his Resurrection, the (Catholic) Church has been manifested as the mystery of salvation by the outpouring of the Holy Spirit. She will be perfected in the glory of heaven as the assembly of all the redeemed of the earth.

The Church is both visible and spiritual, a hierarchical society and the Mystical Body of Christ. She is one, yet formed of two components, human and divine. That is her mystery, which only faith can accept.

The Church in this world is the sacrament of salvation, the sign and the instrument of the communion of God and people. (CCC 778-780)

- 5. Catholics and Protestants believe in many of the same things. But what are the things that make us different?

Further Questions for Discussion:

- 1. Why can't I just be a "good person" and not be part of the Church? Maybe Jesus gave us the Church so that we could make use of all the "tools" (eg., Eucharist) in order to go to heaven?
- 2. Why did Jesus give us a Church? Why couldn't He just let us be and find our own way to heaven?
- 3. Why do we need the hierarchy of the Church, such as the Pope and Bishops? (Think of what would happen if everyone could pick and choose what to believe).

Grade 10, unit 2 (Called to be Church), Grade 11, unit 6 (We Continue in Faith)

We Believe: The Church is not stuck in the middle-ages, even though many people claim that the Church is the oppressor of man. Just the opposite is true. The Church has been given a mandate to preach the good news to all people, and sometimes this good news is challenging, but the Church is not afraid to proclaim from the roof tops that only "the truth will set us free." The Gospel is not easy to live out in the world today, but just because it is hard, it doesn't mean that the Church, which speaks with the voice of God in the world, should lower the bar and give people a false sense of freedom. Only in Christ are we truly ourselves and truly free.

Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today and forever: (Hebrews 13:8-9) Don't conform, be transformed: (Romans 12:2)

Questions for Discussion:

- 1. Why is the Church stuck in the Middle Ages?
- 2. The Church should get rid of its hierarchical structure and be more democratic and open to dialogue.
- 3. As a Catholic, am I not allowed to question the Church's teaching? Perhaps the Church is wrong about some things. Do I have to believe everything the Church teaches?
- The Church should stop judging people and imposing her teaching on everybody. We should all be free to make our own choices.
- 5. I should decide what is right for me. Isn't morality a matter of my own conscience?

Further Questions for Discussion:

- 1. Why doesn't the Church change some of her teachings?
- 2. If something is considered TRUTH, then can it change?
- 3. What is the role of the hierarchy? Is it to change the teachings of Christ or does it have the mandate to preserve and guard the faith from error?
- 4. Does the Church have to adapt to everything our culture says is good? But what if society has been led astray?
- 5. Who do we believe: Jesus and his Church, or a society which tells us to do whatever feels good?
- 6. Before we question the Church, should we not first try and see WHY the Church teaches what she teaches?

Grade 9, unit 4 (Called to Freedom) Grade 10, unit 4 (Called to be Holy)

We Believe: God created man a rational being, conferring on him the dignity of a person who can initiate and control his own actions. "God willed that man should be 'left in the hand of his own counsel,' so that he might of his own accord seek his Creator and freely attain his full and blessed perfection by cleaving to him." Man is rational and therefore like God; he is created with free will and is master over his acts. (CCC 1730)

Word of God:

No one knows the day nor the hour: (Matthew 24:36) God's Will be done: (Matthew 6:10, Matthew 26:42) Put your trust in God and his plan: (Proverbs 3:5-6)

Questions for Discussion:

- 1. Does God have a plan for our lives?
- 2. Why does perfect love require free will?
- 3. If God is all knowing, then do I still have free will?
- 4. How do we figure out God's plan for us?
- 5. Does God have one specific plan for each of us, or are there many options?

Further Questions for Discussion:

- 1. "Lord, I give you permission to do what you need to do in my life." Do you have enough trust in God to say this prayer?
- 2. What is God's plan for all humanity?
- 3. Jesus said to his Father in heaven "Your will be done" (Matthew 26:42). The Church and her Saints have always taught that our happiness lies in doing God's will. Why should we seek to do God's will and not our own? Doesn't this conflict with our freedom?

We Believe: "Christ", in Greek, "Messiah" in Hebrew, means the "anointed one". Jesus is the Christ because he is consecrated by God and anointed by the Holy Spirit for his redeeming mission. He is the Messiah awaited by Israel, sent into the world by the Father. Jesus accepted the title Messiah but he made the meaning of the term clear: "come down from heaven" (John 3:13), crucified and then risen, he is the Suffering Servant "who gives his life as a ransom for the many" (Matthew 20:28). From the name Christ comes our name of Christian. (Compendium of the CCC)

Grade 10, unit 2 (Called to be Church)

We Believe: Behind the disobedient choice of our first parents lurks a seductive voice opposed to God, which makes them fall into death out of envy. Scripture and the Church's Tradition see in this being a fallen angel, called "Satan" or the "devil." The Church teaches that Satan was at first a good angel, made by God: "The devil and the other demons were indeed created naturally good by God, but they became evil by their own doing." (CCC 391)

Satan as "Father of Lies": (John 8:44)
Believers have power to resist Satan: (1 Peter 5:8-9)

- 3. What kind of power does he have?
- 4. Does Satan have the power to lead us into temptation?

We Believe: Those who die in God's grace and friendship and are perfectly purified, live for ever with Christ. They are like God for ever for they "see Him as He is," face to face (CCC 1023). Heaven is a "living, personal relationship with the Holy Trinity. It is our meeting with the Father which takes place in the risen Christ through the communion of the Holy Spirit."

Who am I? Do you know who you are? Do you know what you are? Is there a difference? Are you always the same person or do you change as you grow? If we are created by God, what does that mean about who we are? Byron and Rosanna explore the Church's teaching on our human identity.

Grade 9, unit 2 (Called to Wholeness)

Grade 10, unit 4 (Called to be Holy), Grade 11, unit 1 (We Encounter Mystery)

We Believe: "God created man in his own image, in the image of God he created him, male and female he created them." Man occupies a unique place in creation: (I) he is "in the image of God;" (II) in his own nature he unites the spiritual and material worlds; (III) he is created "male and female;" (IV) God established him in His friendship. (CCC 355)

Of all visible creatures only man is "able to know and love his creator." He is "the only creature on earth that God has willed for its own sake," and he alone is called to share by knowledge and love in God's own life. It was for this end that he was created, and this is the fundamental reason for his dignity. (CCC 356)

Questions for Discussion:

- 1. What does it mean to say that we are made in the image of God?
- 2. We possess the dignity of a person. What does it mean to be a person, who is not something, but someone?
- 3. What makes us different from the animals?
- 4. Why are humans the only ones able to know and love their creator?
